
Psalmody

Thanks be to God.



The Chapel of the Resurrection is built on the traditional homelands of several indigenous peoples, most notably the Potawatomi (Bodéwadmik) Nation. The land was ceded by Potawatomi leaders to the U.S. federal authorities on October 26, 1832, as part of the Treaty of Tippecanoe. We meet in this place indebted to this forced generosity. Some of the indigenous population successfully resisted removal. Members of the Pokagon Band of Potawatomi (Pokégnek Bodéwadmik) established a sovereign government in Dowagiac, Michigan, and continue to live, work, and worship as our neighbors.

Remembering Rev. Dr. David G. Truemper



David Truemper was a beloved teacher, mentor, friend, and colleague in Christian ministry. His service to Valparaiso University began in 1967 and lasted 37 years. He was first and foremost a professor of theology, mentoring thousands of Valpo students who would go on to careers as ministry professionals and many others—engineers, nurses, doctors, teachers, administrators, business and marketing professionals, and countless other paths of Christian discipleship. David served as chair of the department of theology and director of Valpo's Reutlingen Study Center. For most of his years at VU he was associated with the Institute of Liturgical Studies, serving as its director from 1985 until his death in 2004. He served as pastor of several congregations in Indiana and preached regularly in the Chapel of the Resurrection. David and his family served the Valpo community in many ways for many years, and the impact of their legacy continues through the ministries of many gathered here tonight and many more who could not be here this evening.
